Word Relationships

As children hit preschool, their vocabulary really picks up speed. Not only are they learning to identify objects in the world around them but they are building an understanding of more abstract concepts, such as how objects relate to one another. Word relationships deepen their understanding of directional and spatial awareness. When they can grasp word relations like opposites or positional words, they become better at expressing their ideas to others and understanding more detailed questions.

Tips to Connect



Try a scavenger hunt for opposites. As a team search the house for items: big and small; high and low; rough and smooth; and hard and soft.
